






Figure 9.27. Transport from the Golgi apparatus Proteins are sorted in the *trans* Golgi network and transported in vesicles to their final destinations. In the absence of specific targeting signals, proteins are carried to the plasma membrane by constitutive secretion. Alternatively, proteins can be diverted from the constitutive secretion pathway and targeted to other destinations, such as lysosomes or regulated secretion from the cells. Figure 9.28. Transport to the plasma membrane of polarized cells The plasma membranes of polarized griptelial cells are divided into apical and basolateral domains. In this example (intestinal epithelial surface of the cell faces the lumen of the intestine, the lateral surfaces are in contact with neighboring cells, and the basal surface rests on a sheet of extracellular matrix (the basal larmina). The apical membrane is characterized by the presence of microvilli, which facilitate the absorption of nutrimets by increasing surface area. Specific proteins are targeted to either the apical or basolateral membranes in the *trans* Golgi network. Tight junctions between neighboring cells maintain the identity of the apical and bas**2d4** and membranes by preventing the diffusion of proteins between these domains.




















